

**GILPIN COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH ORDER 21-02 – GILPIN COUNTY DIAL
IN AND FOR GILPIN COUNTY, COLORADO**

The Gilpin County Board of Health (“Board”) and the Gilpin County Public Health Agency are working to stop the spread of Coronavirus 2019 (“COVID-19”). To this end, Gilpin County is currently operating under Amendment 2 to Gilpin County PHO 20-14, which adopts the State’s COVID-19 Dial with some stricter County specific modifications. On April 16, 2021, the Governor and Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (“CDPHE”) will discontinue the State’s COVID-19 Dial in lieu of allowing counties to have local control over county public health. In light of this, it is necessary for the Board to determine its local control public health measures. The Board adopts the following Gilpin County COVID-19 Dial as modified herein in order to continue to control and slow the spread of the SARS-CoV-2 virus and to mitigate the effects of the disease COVID-19 caused by the virus.

SECTION I - FINDINGS AND NECESSITY OF ORDER

Whereas, the Board has public health jurisdiction over Gilpin County, Colorado (“Gilpin County”) including all cities and towns therein. In furtherance of its jurisdiction, the Board has the power and duty to investigate and control the causes of epidemic or communicable diseases and conditions affecting the public health within Gilpin County, as well as the power and duty to close schools and public places and to prohibit gatherings of people when necessary to protect public health, and to establish, maintain, and enforce isolation and quarantine, and in pursuance thereof, to exercise physical control over property and over persons within Gilpin County as Board may find necessary for the protection of public health; and

COVID-19 is a respiratory illness transmitted like other respiratory illness through person-to-person contact or by contact with surfaces contaminated with the virus. Persons infected with COVID-19 may become symptomatic anywhere from two to fourteen days after exposure. Symptoms include fever, cough or shortness of breath or difficulty breathing. Individuals with serious chronic health conditions and older adults are most at risk for becoming very ill with this disease.

While Colorado has started vaccinating those who are most vulnerable to COVID-19, estimates indicate that as of April 12, 2021, only about 30% of the population is currently immune to COVID-19; this is far short of the percentage of the population needed to reach herd immunity. Additionally, new variants that are more transmissible are circulating in Colorado. These factors,

coupled with a loosening of restrictions, could result in an increase in cases.¹ While we work as a community to reach herd immunity through vaccination, it is important that the protective measures of the COVID-19 Dial remain in place to help reduce the risk of transmission until we reach that critical threshold.

While Gilpin County's one-week incident rates have dropped from the peaks of November and December, 2020, case counts can be/are variable from week to week and have been steadily increasing for the past several weeks. Elimination of the COVID-19 Dial measures will likely lead to increased case counts in Gilpin County until enough people have been vaccinated to reach the threshold to achieve herd immunity. As of April 11, 2021, there were 478,678 known presumptive positive cases of COVID-19 statewide in Colorado, and 207 known presumptive positive cases in Gilpin County, Colorado, as well as 6,296 deaths due to COVID-19 statewide and 3 deaths in Gilpin County.

Vaccine access is increasing but demand for the vaccine still exceeds available supply. Hospital admission rates provide a specific metric that accounts for severity of cases.

SECTION II – HISTORY OF RELEVANT STATE AND BOARD ORDERS

On March 10, 2020, the Governor of Colorado declared a State of Emergency relating to the presence of COVID-19.

On March 25, 2020, the Governor of Colorado issued Executive Order D 2020-017, ordering all Coloradans to Stay-at-Home due to the presence of COVID-19 in the state ("Stay-at-Home Order").

On April 26, the Governor of Colorado issued Executive Order D 2020-044, Safer at Home, through May 27, 2020 ("Safer-at-Home Order").

On June 1, 2020, the Governor of Colorado issued Executive Order D 2020-091, Safer-at-Home and in the Vast, Great Outdoors ("Safer-at-Home and in the Vast, Great Outdoors Order"), which was extended by Executive Order D 2020-213 until November 5, 2020.

Gilpin County's movement from the Stay-At-Home Order to Safer-At-Home and in the Vast, Great Outdoors Order resulted in the easing of social distancing restrictions in Gilpin County.

On September 16, 2020, the Executive Director of CDPHE issued Public Health Order 20-35, Safer at Home Dial, which superseded and replaced Public Health Order 20-28 (“PHO 20-35”).

On November 2, 2020, the Executive Director of CDPHE issued Public Health Order 20-36, COVID-19 Dial, which supersedes and replaces Public Health Order 20-35 (“PHO 20-36”).

On April 16, 2021, PHO 20-36 is expected to expire and the COVID-19 Dial will become non-mandatory guidance at the State level.

Counties in the Denver Metropolitan Area, to ensure consistency and minimize confusion for businesses and the community, desire to adopt CDPHE’s COVID-19 Dial as issued on April 4, 2021 and as amended herein. The Board agrees consistency with surrounding counties is recommended to the extent possible given the regular travel of Gilpin County residents, commuting workers, and visitors between Gilpin County and the Denver Metropolitan Area. The Board may, however, diverge from other counties as the Board deems best for public health and the County. The Board diverges slightly in this Order.

By this PHO Order 21-02, the Board will set Gilpin County at the restrictions of Level Green on the Gilpin County Dial as shown in the attached table in **Appendix 1**, based on the County’s health metrics as of April 15, 2021. The Board will move the County to less or more restrictive levels on the Gilpin County Dial as public health metrics and considerations require.

SECTION III – INTENT ORDER

The intent of this Gilpin County Dial Order is to continue to control the slow and spread of COVID-19, maintain consistency and avoid confusion in public health measures for Gilpin County, and protect the public health, safety, and welfare of the Gilpin County community.

SECTION IV - DEFINITIONS

- 1. Critical Business** is any business that is designated as a critical business under the terms of the CDPHE “[Tenth Amended Public Health Order 20-36 COVID-19 Dial](#)” dated April 4, 2021. The list of Critical Businesses is included in Appendix B.
- 2. Critical Government Function** is any governmental function that is designated as critical under the terms of the CDPHE “[Tenth Amended Public Health Order 20-36 COVID-19 Dial](#)” dated April 4, 2021. The list of Critical Government Functions is included in Appendix B.

SECTION V - ORDER

Pursuant to the authority granted the Gilpin County Board of Health in C.R.S. §§ 25-1-506 and 508, the following is ordered:

1. Assignment to and Movement Between Dial Levels

a. Phase 1: Moving Toward Full Reopening – April 16, 2021 through May 16, 2021

- i. Level Designation:** Upon devolution of statewide Public Health Order 20-36, on April 16, 2021, the Board adopts the State’s COVID-19 Dial framework set forth in CDPHE Public Health Order 20-36, as modified below (the “Dial”), and Gilpin County will be assigned to Level Green based on its case incidence and positivity Dial metrics as of April 15, 2021 (“Phase 1 Level”).
- ii. Duration:** Between April 16, 2021 and May 16, 2021, Gilpin County will remain at the Phase 1 Level Green.
- iii. Movement:** Gilpin County will not move levels during this 30-day Phase 1.
- iv. Restrictions:** All businesses and activities within Gilpin County must follow the Capacity Restrictions for the Phase 1 Level Green listed in **Appendix 1** and located in Section V.2 of this Order and the Mitigation Requirements for All Sectors located in Section V.3 of this Order.

b. Phase 2: Observation Period – May 16, 2021 through August 15, 2021

- i. Level Designation:** Upon conclusion of Phase 1 on May 16, 2021, Gilpin will move to Level Clear – New Normal – 100% capacity with no Mitigation Requirements. Face covering requirements may still apply and State orders, if any, may still apply. In addition, municipal jurisdictions (Central City and Black Hawk) may implement their own more restrictive protective, and this Order shall not be construed as prohibiting any business from implementing or continuing more restrictive protective measures.
- ii. Duration:** Between May 16, 2021 and August 15, 2021 – 90 days – Gilpin County will remain at Level Clear, subject to observation of COVID-19 severity metrics by the Gilpin County Public Health Agency and movement as defined in Paragraph III.1.b.iii.
- iii. Movement:** Gilpin County will begin Phase 2 in Level Clear. Gilpin County may then be assigned to the Dial Level most reflective of its rate of hospital admissions of County residents as described in this section and **Appendix 1**. Gilpin County will move to more or less protective Levels if experiencing rates reflective of more or less protective Levels for 7 consecutive days over a 14-day rolling average.
 - 1) Level Clear: 0-1 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.
 - 2) Level Green: 1-2 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.

- 3) Level Blue: 2-3 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.
 - 4) Level Yellow: 3-4 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.
 - 5) Level Orange: 4-5 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.
 - 6) Level Red: More than 5 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period.
 - 7) Level Purple: More than 5 hospital admissions of County residents per 100,000 population over a 14-day period and hospital capacity is threatened.
- iv. **Restrictions:** Gilpin County must follow the Capacity Restrictions for their assigned Level located in Section V.2 and **Appendix 1** of this Order. Mitigation Requirements for All Sectors located in Section V.3 of this Order are not required under Level Clear.
 - c. The Board, in the interests of public health, safety, and welfare, reserves the right to move Gilpin County one or more Levels quicker than stated above and to implement other restrictions as circumstances warrant.

2. Capacity Restrictions

- a. Gilpin County shall follow the capacity restrictions set forth on **Appendix 1** for its Level designation.
- b. Any business or activity not specifically addressed in this Order or **Appendix 1** may operate as an indoor or outdoor event, depending on whether the business or activity is indoors or outdoors.
- c. There are no local Capacity Restrictions or Mitigation Requirements in Level Clear except as provided by any statewide order or local face covering order.

3. Mitigation Requirements for All Sectors – Levels Green, Blue, Yellow, Orange, Red & Purple

- a. All requirements in this section shall apply unless impossible or unsafe to carry out the activity or function while complying.
- b. Critical Businesses and Critical Government Functions may continue to operate, and must comply with Distancing Requirements, all of the requirements in this Order, and any applicable executive orders or CDPHE public health orders and mandatory guidance, unless doing so would make it impossible to carry out critical functions.
- c. **Distancing Requirements**
 - i. Individuals shall maintain at least 6 feet of distance from other individuals who are non-household members. However, nothing in this section shall limit groups of up to 10 individuals from attending events together or patronizing a

restaurant or bar together; and nothing in this section shall limit organized sports activities; so long as these activities comply with the requirements of this Order.

- ii. Businesses should arrange their space or seating areas to accommodate 6-foot distancing of non-household members at all times.
- iii. Shared or common indoor areas where people can congregate without observing 6-foot distancing should be closed or discouraged.
- iv. Virtual meetings should occur where possible to reduce unnecessary in-person gatherings.
- v. Prioritize remote work and enable it whenever practical.
- vi. Adopt policies to reduce density, such as staggering arrivals and dismissals of employees and customers, using reservation systems, marking spaces 6-feet apart where lines tend to form, and designating separate entrances and exits.

d. Face Covering Requirements

- i. Face coverings are required pursuant to Executive Order D 2020 138, as amended and extended, and the Board’s Face Covering Order, as set forth previously in Gilpin County , as amended and extended.
- ii. Employers should provide protective gear such as face shields and gloves, where appropriate, and face coverings.

e. Hygiene, Cleaning and Disinfecting

- i. Employers must require employees showing any symptoms or signs of sickness, or who has been in contact with known positive cases to stay home. Employers must ensure paid sick leave policies are consistent with state law and communicate those policies to employees. See the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment’s [Paid Leave Under the Healthy Families and Workplaces Act Interpretive Notice & Formal Opinion \[En Español\]](#) and [Colorado Workplace Public Health Rights Poster \[En Español\]](#).
- ii. Customers showing any symptoms or signs of sickness, or who have been in contact with known positive cases must stay home and follow isolation and quarantine guidance. Businesses should implement flexible cancellation policies to encourage customers to stay home when ill or exposed.
- iii. Follow [CDC’s When and How to Wash Your Hands guidance](#).
- iv. Follow [CDC’s Cleaning and Disinfecting Your Facility guidance](#).

f. Ventilation

- i. Ensure proper ventilation and maximize ventilation by adopting strategies such as opening windows whenever possible and upgrading air filters.
- ii. Businesses and individuals are encouraged to move interactions among members of different households outside whenever possible.

g. Signage

- i. Post signage that face coverings are required to enter any public indoor space per the requirements of Executive Order D 2020 138, as amended, or per the requirements of BOARD’s Face Covering Order.
- ii. Post signage on good hygiene practices, including washing hands and distancing.
- iii. Post signage prohibiting anyone showing any symptoms or signs of sickness from entering.
- iv. All signage should be easy to follow and in languages employees and customers understand.

h. Personal Social Gatherings

- i. Indoor Personal Social Gatherings should follow [CDC guidance on gatherings](#). This Order presumes that an indoor personal social gathering consists of 10 people or less. Indoor gatherings greater than 10 people should follow indoor events requirements as defined by the applicable level in **Appendix 1**.

4. Business 5 Star Certification Programs

- a. Gilpin County may choose to continue its Business 5 Star Certification Program under this Order.
- b. All County Program operations must comply with CDPHE’s Program requirements as stated in the 10th Amended Public Health Order 20-36, except that businesses are not required to symptom screen customers or collect contact information from customers.

5. Casinos – Gaming Operations – Guidance. Additional and specific public health guidance and protocols are set forth in **Appendix 2**.

6. Dial Level Green Board of Health Approved Removal, Reduction, and/or Clarification of Restrictions.

- a. **No Last Call for Alcohol Public Health Time Restrictions.** The time-of-day restrictions on the sale of alcohol shall no longer exist in Gilpin County in Level Green of the Dial, except to the extent such restrictions exist in local liquor licenses or may be imposed in accordance with state and local liquor licensing authority under Colorado law including without limitation C.R.S. § 12-47-101 *et seq.*
- b. **Short-Term Rentals.** The restrictions and requirements on gatherings also apply to residences and residential properties used for short-term rentals. Short-term rentals exceeding these limitations are not allowed. Short-term rental property owners are required to disclose this Order and Gilpin County public health orders and comply with all Gilpin County regulations.

- c. **Gilpin County Board of Health PHO No. 20-5 Requirements for Facial Coverings on County Property.** Except to the extent modified by this Order, Gilpin County PHO 20-5 governs the use of Facial Coverings on any Gilpin County government property. This Order amends Gilpin County Public Health Order 20-5 by eliminating the requirement for masks outdoors on Gilpin County government property but only to the extent at least 6-feet of physical distancing can be and is maintained between persons not from the same household. A revised version of Gilpin County PHO 20-5 including this amendment (Amendment 1 to Gilpin County PHO 20-5) can be found on the County’s website www.gilpincounty.org.
- d. **Gilpin County Board of Health Order PHO No. 20-11 Remains in Effect and Governs Requirements for Facial Coverings on Non-County Property.** Gilpin County PHO 20-11 previously adopted the Governor’s Executive Order D 2020 138 imposing Facial Covering requirements for “Public Indoor Spaces”. CDPHE’s Ninth Amended PHO 20-26 references and incorporates Executive Order D 2020 138. It is possible, however, that CDPHE may remove the Facial Covering requirements or make them less restrictive in early April 2021. In anticipation of that potential change, the Gilpin County Board of Health in consultation with its Public Health Agency believe continuation of the Facial Covering requirements as currently exist under Executive Order D 2020 138 beyond early April is recommended based on current public health conditions, the level of vaccinations still needing to be completed, existence and increased prevalence of COVID-19 variants, and the minimal burden masks cause weighed against the significant benefit masks have in protecting public health in helping prevent the spread of the virus. The Facial Covering requirements under Executive Order D 2020 138 are included in **Appendix 3** herein. Subject to certain exceptions, Executive Order D 2020 138 requires Facial Coverings be worn in any “Public Indoor Space”, which is defined as “any enclosed indoor area that is publicly or privately owned, managed, or operated to which individuals have access by right or by invitation, expressed or implied, and that is accessible to the public, serves as a place of employment, or is an entity providing services.” Businesses shall deny admittance or service to individuals who refuse to comply with this Order and require the removal of any individual who fails to wear a Face Covering. Gilpin County Public Health may publish information about any outbreak at a business so that the public is aware of the extent and nature of disease spread in the community. Acceptable facial coverings/masks are those approved by the Center for Disease Control (“CDC”). See <https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/about-face-coverings.html>.

SECTION VI - OTHER PUBLIC HEALTH ORDERS RELATED TO COVID-19

1. Nothing in this Order should be construed to preempt any State of Colorado regulations (including CDPHE Orders) concerning medical Face Coverings.
2. Nothing in this Order should be construed to preempt any State of Colorado regulations (including CDPHE Orders and Executive Orders) that impose Face Covering requirements beyond those contained in this Order.
3. Nothing in this Order should be construed to preempt any local Public Health Orders.
4. Nothing in this Order shall be construed to prevent a municipality from adopting more protective standards than those contained in this Order.
5. This Order is in addition to all executive orders issued by the Governor of Colorado and all public health orders and mandatory guidance documents issued by CDPHE. If there is a conflict between this Order and any executive order, CDPHE public health order, or local public health order, the most restrictive order applies.

SECTION VII - ADVISEMENT AND ADDITIONAL INFORMATION



This Order is necessary to control the transmission of disease to others. Immediate issuance of this Order is necessary for the preservation of public health, safety, or welfare.

4. **FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH THIS ORDER IS SUBJECT TO PENALTIES CONTAINED IN C.R.S. §§ 25-1-114 and 25-1-516, INCLUDING A FINE OF UP TO FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$5,000.00) AND IMPRISONMENT IN THE COUNTY JAIL FOR UP TO ONE YEAR.**

5. If any provision of this Order, or its application to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid, then the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.



APPENDIX 2

COVID-19 GUIDANCE FOR CASINOS

Health and Safety Policies for Resumption of Gaming Operations

The gaming industry is perhaps one of the tightest regulated businesses in the state to oversee both health and welfare of all participants. The primary goal is to work with each casino and the state and county health departments to ensure that the Division's regulatory responsibilities are met upon reopening of the casino industry while simultaneously ensuring Division staff is adhering to all social distancing requirements and safety precautions as we perform our regulatory and police duties.

This will be achieved by implementing policies and monitoring to ensure compliance. The Division of Gaming serves multiple functions in the towns of Black Hawk, Central City and Cripple Creek on a daily basis with offices in Cripple Creek and Central City that carry out our duties and monitor the 24-hour, 7 days-a-week gaming operations. These offices are staffed by Division of Gaming employees who work in the 33 operational casinos and routinely patrol and interact with casino personnel and customers on a daily basis.

Licenses shall operate consistent with all applicable requirements of current State and County Public Health Orders.

The division personnel are routinely in all casinos, throughout operating hours, this interaction will support the efforts of the casinos and their employees to remain in compliance by reporting observed concerns immediately to casino management for the purpose of taking appropriate remedial action. Licenses may be referred directly to local public health officials and/or Five-Star Administrative Committees (for Five-Star Certified businesses) for continued and/or egregious violations. Continued non-compliance or egregious violations may also be referred to the Division of Gaming's Director for possible Administrative action.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES TO KEEP IN MIND

The more an individual interacts with others in person, and the longer that interaction, the higher the risk of COVID-19 spread and widespread COVID-19 outbreaks. The risk of COVID-19 spread increases in a casino or gaming setting as follows:

Colorado Limited Gaming Act 44-30-102 in part states, “therefore be licensed, controlled, and assisted to protect the public health, safety, good order, and the general welfare of the inhabitants of the state to foster the stability and success of limited gaming and to preserve the economy and policies of free competition of the state of Colorado.” Gaming Rules 3-30-301—Qualifications for Licensure (3). “[To qualify for licensure an applicant must] Possess premises to be used for gaming that are deemed suitable by the Commission and that satisfy all health and safety requirements.” 30-401 Responsibility of licensee: “Responsibility for the employment and maintenance of lawful methods of operation rests with the licensee, and willful or persistent use or toleration of methods of operation considered unlawful by the Commission is prohibited. Each licensee shall fully and timely perform each and every term, condition and duty required by the rules and regulations of the Commission.”

TABLE GAMES REOPENING PLAN FOR CASINOS

In consultation with the Office of the Governor, local health officials, and the industry stakeholders, along with feedback from other state casino regulatory agencies, the Division has created this policy to (1) control admittance to check for health conditions of employees and customers, (2) keep people from different households safely distanced at least six feet apart, (3) clean and disinfect all frequently-touched areas, especially after use by any employee or patron, (4) assure all people wear protective facial coverings, (5) ensure proper ventilation throughout the facility, and (6) monitor compliance and remove any violators. Additionally, casinos should operate in full conjunction with the practices and recommendations within current [CDPHE Workplace Outbreak Guidance](#) , as well as current [CDC Business Guidance](#) . The details herein are additional specifics for this industry that are to be taken on top of what the general guidance says to do.

All casino operations shall implement and follow all emergency rules promulgated by the Colorado Limited Gaming Control Commission, other relevant State regulatory body rules or guidelines, as well as any other orders passed by state or local health departments.

All Retail Licensees, Master licensees and Sports Betting Operators shall submit a Health and Safety Plan to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and infectious diseases for their area of operation that conforms to this policy. A Master Licensee, acting as its own operator or sharing responsibility for operation of the sports betting operation, may include the Sports Betting Operation within the overall plan for the Retail Licensee. Plans required pursuant to this policy should be regularly and continuously reviewed and executed to ensure the health and safety of licensees’ guests and employees.

(1) Control admittance to check for health conditions of employees and customers

Live, masked personnel will control all entrances to monitor customer numbers in the facilities, verify facial coverings are worn by all, unless wearing a facial covering inhibits their health, take

temperatures, conduct health screening and ask exposure questions, encourage use of hand sanitizer for employees and guests as they enter and exit the gaming facility. The casinos have security cameras and live surveillance requirements that monitor all areas of a casino. This type of live monitoring can ensure that customers are practicing all current social distancing requirements and alert proper casino personnel to respond and remedy any improper gatherings within the casino.

Each gaming establishment shall limit entry and exit points to better control and monitor occupancy within the gaming establishment. All casinos must have posted at gaming entry points the most currently available [CDC checklist](#) of COVID- 19 symptoms and must ask each visitor to read the [list](#) , and if there is an affirmative answer to any of the questions about [symptoms](#) or possible exposures, provide additional screening and follow up appropriate to the situation.

All persons seeking to enter the gaming space must have their temperature taken by non- invasive means by a gaming employee . Persons exhibiting a temporal body temperature of 100.4 °F or greater will be denied entry and will not be permitted to enter any casino area.

The Licensee agrees to monitor conditions and Public Health Orders in effect for the county in which it is located, and these restrictions are subject to change to reflect any additional requirements in the Dial Level assigned to it. This may mean increased or decreased restrictions depending on the County’s status on the Dial, and the business entity agrees to make changes as necessary to adjust to Dial Level changes.

(2) Keep people safely distanced at least six feet

Licensees may operate at occupancy restrictions applicable to the State COVID-19 Dial Level currently assigned to the county in which the licensee is located. Any area where patrons routinely queue shall be marked with appropriate signage and/or social distancing markings encouraging social distancing of a minimum of six (6) feet between households. Proper indications should be marked on the floor when applicable, such as in sports betting when placing bets at a kiosk or at a ticket window, to ensure that space is maintained by the public. A physical divider should be installed wherever there is interaction at a counter between a gaming employee and a patron.

Guests and employees will maintain and observe proper social distancing protocols. Every other directly adjacent slot machine will be turned off unless being played by a single player. If adjacent games are enabled for play by a single player, casinos must have procedures in place to ensure that directly adjacent slots machines do not remain in play after the guest has finished play.

Casinos will take all reasonable measures to ensure that every operational slot machine is sanitized before a player sits at the machine, by implementing either a system-driven notification (the machine itself alerts staff the player has stopped playing), or a process by which casino staff monitor machines for departing players and make their best effort to sanitize the machine before a new guest begins play. Machines will also be sanitized on a regular schedule.

Staff will be trained to inform guests that they are prohibited from congregating around any slot machine, and that masks must cover nose and mouth at all times in the casino. Employees must be fully empowered to require guests to disperse and/or re-mask, as needed.

Back of the house and employee social distancing protocols, as provided by state and local health authorities, must be implemented in employee dining rooms, employee entrances, uniform control rooms, employee restrooms, loading docks, offices, kitchens, security scanning podiums, employee relations service desks, and training classrooms.

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(3) Clean and disinfect all frequently-touched areas, especially after use by any employee or patron

Each retail licensee shall have adequate protective equipment for employees and plentiful sanitizer and disinfecting wipes for both employees and customers throughout the facility. The gaming floor will be cleaned using current continual cleaning protocols. In addition, areas of the floor will be closed on a rotating basis to ensure each area of the gaming floor is deep cleaned at least once in a 24-hour period. For casinos opting not to stay open for 24 hours, deep cleaning may occur overnight.

Staff will clean machines as they see players leave, and on a regular schedule. All public areas should be cleaned and disinfected on a continual and regular basis, including elevators and elevator buttons, door handles, room keys and locks, ATMs, redemption terminals, rewards club kiosks, escalator and stair handrails, casino cage counters, gaming machines, gaming tables, dining surfaces, restaurant menus, front desk check-in counters, bell desks, etc. Bathrooms will be thoroughly disinfected throughout the day.

Each licensee must ensure and document that its employees are adequately trained on the proper cleaning and disinfecting procedures set forth in the [CDC's guidance](#), and how to prevent the spread of infectious disease, including, without limitation, social distancing, hand washing, and reducing the spread of germs at work.

Facilities should always place a high priority on air quality for patrons and employees, continuously reviewing the operation of their [HVAC systems](#) to identify additional opportunities to enhance their effectiveness. Casinos should take rigorous measures in accordance with the established guidelines to help mitigate the risk of virus transmission through ventilation systems. Casinos should maintain business-specific plans for outbreak detection, reporting and response reflecting the practices and recommendations set forth in current [CDPHE Workplace Outbreak Guidance](#).

The Licensee agrees to monitor conditions and Public Health Orders in effect for the county in which it is located, and these restrictions are subject to change to reflect any additional requirements in the Dial Level assigned to it. This may mean increased or decreased restrictions depending on the County's status on the Dial, and the business entity agrees to make changes as necessary to adjust to Dial Level changes.

(4) Ensure all people wear protective facial coverings

All persons seeking to enter the gaming space must wear a face covering while in the gaming area, unless wearing a facial covering inhibits their health. Persons not having face covering will be given one by the casino. The face covering, whether personal or property-provided, should sufficiently cover the nose and mouth. Any personal mask brought to the facility by the customer, which covers more than just the nose and mouth, may be subject to inspection and approval by security personnel or Division representatives. Persons refusing to wear facial covering, that do not have a medical reason, will be denied entry.

The Licensee agrees to monitor conditions and Public Health Orders in effect for the county in which it is located, and these restrictions are subject to change to reflect any additional requirements in the Dial Level assigned to it. This may mean increased or decreased restrictions depending on the County's status on the Dial, and the business entity agrees to make changes as necessary to adjust to Dial Level changes.

(5) Monitor compliance and remove any violators

Casino employees will be situated at all guest points of entry to conduct health screenings, ensure masks are worn and remind guests that masks are required at all times in the casino unless they are seated at a restaurant table and to inform guests that enhanced public health protocols are in place throughout the facility. Compliance with occupancy restrictions will be monitored by a method appropriate to each property, such as physical counting or electronic methods, subject to the guidance and approval of local public health officials. This may include without limitation, headcounts by security personnel, utilization of a licensee's existing surveillance systems, making use of a licensee's slot accounting system to aid in monitoring the number of patrons on the casino floor, or other electronic methods.

Licensees shall remove from the facility any patron, employee or other persons who refuses to comply with applicable requirements of current State and/or County Public Health Orders or the Casino's business-specific operating plan.

Licensees shall assign employees to focus on ensuring guests do not congregate in groups. All casinos currently have at least one Key licensee on duty that has management level authority to ensure that all employees follow and enforce all health and safety requirements contained in the casinos operating plan.

The Licensee agrees to monitor conditions and Public Health Orders in effect for the county in which it is located, and these restrictions are subject to change to reflect any additional requirements in the Dial Level assigned to it. This may mean increased or decreased restrictions depending on the County's status on the Dial, and the business entity agrees to make changes as necessary to adjust to Dial Level changes.

(6) Table Games and Card Games

Table games represent unique challenges to safe practices in that they are normally characterized by a crowded table, sharing of chips, and frequent changes in players. For this reason, we are addressing table games separately in terms of distancing, cleaning, and sanitizing as we plan to

reopen in the safest environment by managing players and their actions before, during and after play.

Games will have the appropriate number of seats removed to allow adequate social distancing. Where six feet of separation between players is not practicable for the game, and a certain number of players is necessary for the game to be played, the dealer will strictly enforce masking and hand sanitizing requirements.

Card Games and Table Games shall be authorized to open under the following guidelines, and depending on the County status on the COVID-19 Dial that the casino is operating under. Casino table and card games may be open for play in the following order and corresponding COVID-19 dial levels.

Distancing: The number of players shall be based on the type of game to ensure safe distancing between players by limiting the number of seats or betting positions. Blackjack is limited to 3 players per table. House Banked Poker is limited to 3 players. Roulette is limited to 4 players. Craps is limited to 6 players. Player Banked Poker is limited to 6 players per table. To strictly limit the number of patrons at a gaming table, casinos may allow groups within the same household that have arrived together and number less than 8 to play together at a table game. Limiting nonfamilial persons may also be possible to achieve through the use of dividers between gaming positions. Casinos will take reasonable measures to increase distancing between tables to help facilitate safe social distancing between players at separate tables. Where six feet of separation between players at separate tables is not operationally feasible, the dealer, casino supervisors and managers will make extra efforts to strictly enforce masking and hand sanitizing requirements and, where practicable, plexiglass dividers may also be installed between gaming positions and/or between players at separate tables. Casino supervisors and managers must ensure that patrons do not congregate in groups around gaming tables.

Sanitizing: Licensees should ensure dealers have hand sanitizer and mandate continued use for dealers and patrons throughout their shifts. Additional breaks for dealers to use facilities where soap and water is available for handwashing are strongly encouraged. Dealers will require players to use hand sanitizer before beginning play. Decks of paper cards shall be switched out after four (4) hours of usage unless they are not being touched by guests. Decks of plastic cards shall be sanitized at least once in a 24-hour period. For craps, players are required to sanitize their hands before handling the dice. For each new roller, or if the dice have been handled between throws, the dice must be cleaned and sanitized. Plans must ensure regular cleaning and disinfection of, without limitation, table games, rails, chairs, dice, roulette balls, card shoes, shufflers, roulette wheels, pit podiums, blackjack discard holders, and tip boxes when a new player or employee comes into contact with any of the aforementioned gaming equipment. Licensees must regularly replace, clean or disinfect cards and chips.

Division personnel observing table games not being operated in this manner shall immediately report such concerns to casino management for corrective action and, where necessary, casino management will re-educate staff on the proper protocols.

Licenses may be referred directly to local public health officials and for continued and/or egregious violations, who may order the licensee to temporarily suspend or permanently cease operating table games.

If the licensee fails to cooperate in remedying violations and/or restoring compliance, or if such local public health authorities determine that laws, regulations, or public health orders, the local or state public health authorities may require terminations or modifications of table game operations. Continued non-compliance or egregious violations may also be referred to the Division of Gaming's Director for possible Administrative action.

The Licensee agrees to monitor conditions and Public Health Orders in effect for the county in which it is located, and these restrictions are subject to change to reflect any additional requirements in the Dial Level assigned to it. This may mean increased or decreased restrictions depending on the County's status on the Dial, and the business entity agrees to make changes as necessary to adjust to Dial Level changes.

(7) Reporting Cases and Outbreaks of COVID-19

IF THERE IS A CONFIRMED CASE OF COVID-19 IN THE CASINO

REOPENING PLAN FOR THE FIELD OFFICES OF THE DIVISION OF GAMING

The Division will ensure that employees wear protective facial coverings, use sanitizer, and practice social distancing of at least six feet in their day-to-day activities and that there is an adequate level of and type of PPE to perform all Division duties, including that of a police officer and first responder.

A plexiglass divider will be installed in the division's office lobbies, between the licensing and public waiting area.

Non-contact temporal thermometers will be in the Division office prior to staff or public occupancy. Persons exhibiting a temporal body temperature of 100.4 °F or greater or are exhibiting COVID-19 symptoms will be denied entry and will not be permitted to enter the gaming office or any licensed area until that person has been evaluated by a medical professional.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

Amending and Extending Executive Orders D 2020 039, D 2020 067, D 2020 092, and D 2020 110 Ordering Individuals in Colorado to Wear Non-Medical Face Coverings

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Governor of the State of Colorado and, in particular, pursuant to Article IV, Section 2 of the Colorado Constitution and the relevant portions of the Colorado Disaster Emergency Act, C.R.S. § 24-33.5-701 *et seq.* (Act), I, Jared Polis, Governor of the State of Colorado, hereby issue this Executive Order amending and extending Executive Orders D 2020 039, D 2020 067, D 2020 092, and D 2020 110 ordering individuals in Colorado to wear a medical or non-medical face covering due to the presence of coronavirus-2019 (COVID-19) in Colorado.

I. Background and Purpose

On March 5, 2020, the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment's (CDPHE) public health laboratory confirmed the first presumptive positive COVID-19 test result in Colorado. Since then, the number of confirmed cases has continued to climb, and there is community spread throughout the State. We have seen over 37,000 infections and lost over 1,700 Coloradans. I verbally declared a disaster emergency on March 10, 2020, and on March 11, 2020, I issued the corresponding Executive Order D 2020 003, as amended by Executive Orders D 2020 018, D 2020 032, D 2020 058, D 2020 076, D 2020 109, and D 2020 125. On March 25, 2020, I requested that the President of the United States declare a Major Disaster for the State of Colorado, pursuant to the Stafford Act. The President approved that request on March 28, 2020.

My administration, along with other State, local, and federal authorities, has taken a wide array of actions to mitigate the effects of the pandemic, prevent further spread, and protect against overwhelming our health care resources. While we have seen indications that our efforts to "flatten the curve" are working, transmission of the virus continues to threaten Coloradans' way of life and livelihoods and current data shows a recent increase in COVID infections. As we take steps to return Coloradans to work, we must continue to take measures to facilitate reopening the economy while protecting public health by taking steps to incorporate best practices to protect individuals from infection.

We have learned that widespread mask use is a low cost and highly effective way to reduce the spread of COVID-19 infections by as much as 65%. Broad adoption of mask wearing in Colorado may have significant economic benefits by allowing the State to prevent re-closures of businesses and schools and, ultimately, return to our normal lives more quickly. A recent study from Goldman Sachs concluded that a federal mask mandate could save the U.S. economy

from taking a 5% hit to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP). At this time, thirty-nine Colorado counties and municipalities already have mandatory mask orders in place.

Under Executive Order D 2020 110, mask wearing is mandatory for employees, contractors, and others providing services for Mass Transportation Operations and Critical Businesses as well as for State and county employees and the individuals they serve at Government Offices and Facilities. These requirements remain intact with this Executive Order.

This Executive Order amends and extends Executive Orders D 2020 039, D 2020 067, D 2020 092, and D 2020 110 to protect Coloradans by requiring individuals in Colorado to wear a non-medical face covering over their nose and mouth, subject to several exceptions.

II. Amendments

Executive Order D 2020 110 is amended as follows:

1. Strike the words “have discretion to” in Paragraph II.D.
2. After Paragraph F, add the following new Paragraphs G through R:
 - G. Except as permitted by Paragraphs L, M, and N, below, all individuals over ten (10) years old must wear a face covering over their nose and mouth when entering or moving within any Public Indoor Space, as such term is defined in Paragraph R of this Executive Order, or while using or waiting to use the services of any taxi, bus, light rail, train, car service, ride-sharing or similar service, or Mass Transportation Operations.
 - H. Any individual who endangers the health of others by knowingly entering or remaining in a Public Indoor Space, as such term is defined in Paragraph R of this Executive Order, in violation of the terms of this Executive Order may be subject to civil or criminal penalties, including but not limited to prosecution for trespass.
 - I. Except as permitted by Paragraphs L, M, and N, below, to protect workers, customers, and the community, no owner, operator, or manager of a Public Indoor Space, as such term is defined in Paragraph R of this Executive Order, may provide service to individuals or allow an individual to enter or move within that Public Indoor Space, unless the individual is wearing a face covering as required by this Executive Order.
 - J. Owners, operators, or managers of Public Indoor Spaces, as such term is defined in Paragraph R of this Executive Order, must post signs at entrance(s) instructing individuals of their legal obligation under this Executive Order to wear a face covering when entering or moving within a Public Indoor Space.

- K. A State or local department or agency that learns that a business licensee is in violation of this Executive Order will consider whether the public health, safety or welfare requires summary, temporary suspension of the business's license to operate (including but not limited to a liquor license).
- L. The following individuals are exempt from the requirements of this Executive Order:
- Individuals ten (10) years old and younger; or
- Individuals who cannot medically tolerate a face covering.
- M. Individuals performing the following activities are exempt from the requirements of this Executive Order while the activity is being performed:
1. Individuals who are hearing impaired or otherwise disabled or who are communicating with someone who is hearing impaired or otherwise disabled and where the ability to see the mouth is essential to communication;
 2. Individuals who are seated at a food service establishment;
 3. Individuals who are exercising alone or with others from the individual's household and a face covering would interfere with the activity;
 4. Individuals who are receiving a personal service where the temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to perform the service;
 5. Individuals who enter a business or receive services and are asked to temporarily remove a face covering for identification purposes;
 6. Individuals who are actively engaged in a public safety role such as law enforcement, firefighters, or emergency medical personnel;
 7. Individuals who are officiating at a religious service; or
 8. Individuals who are giving a speech for broadcast or an audience.
- N. Counties that complete certification for Protect Our Neighbors may choose to be exempt from Paragraphs G through N, and R of this Executive Order.
- O. Nothing in this Executive Order should be construed to prevent individuals from wearing a surgical-grade mask or other, more protective face covering to cover the nose and mouth if that type of mask or more protective face covering is appropriate under industry standards.

- P. Nothing in this Executive Order prevents a county or municipality from adopting more protective standards than those contained in this Executive Order.
- Q. Except as modified by this Executive Order, all Executive Orders or Public Health Orders, including Public Health Order 20-31, issued due to COVID-19 and that are currently in effect shall remain in full force and effect as originally promulgated.
- R. For the purposes of this Executive Order, Public Indoor Space means any enclosed indoor area that is publicly or privately owned, managed, or operated to which individuals have access by right or by invitation, expressed or implied, and that is accessible to the public, serves as a place of employment, or is an entity providing services. Public Indoor Space does not mean a person's residence, including a room in a motel or hotel or a residential room for students at an educational facility.

III. Duration

Executive Order D 2020 039, as extended by Executive Order D 2020 067, and as amended and extended by Executive Orders D 2020 092, D 2020 110, and this Executive Order, shall expire thirty (30) days from July 16, 2020, unless extended further by Executive Order. In all other respects, Executive Order D 2020 039, as amended and extended by Executive Orders D 2020 067, D 2020 092, and D 2020 110, shall remain in full force and effect as originally promulgated.
